Negotiations Continue For New LAUSD Contract

Local 572 is currently engaged in challenging contract negotiations with the Los Angeles Unified School District.

Chief Negotiators and Business Agents Adriana Salazar Avila and Mike Ford have submitted 23 pages of proposed improvements. They include language that prohibits the District from discriminating against classified employees, improvements to work schedules and increases in assignment basis. Of special importance are salary realignments and overall salary increases for the entire unit.

The negotiating team includes both active members and hardworking shop stewards. They are receiving major support from Local 572 Secretary-Treasurer Rick Middleton and Local 572 General Counsel Lourdes M. Garcia.

The new contract will cover approximately 3,800 Local 572

members, including plant managers, food service managers, school administrative assistants, information technology specialists, facilities and transportation personnel, area bus supervisors, dispatchers and planners.

"Local 572 members are the backbone of the school system," reported Salazar Avila. "They are the men and women who keep a vigilant eye on everything from the buildings to the buses, from the computers to cafeterias. They ensure that the District runs as efficiently as possible."

The Health Benefits
Committee (HBC)—of which
Local 572 is an active participant—
recently negotiated a landmark
contract with Anthem Blue Cross
that will increase benefits for
retirees, and, in a period of five
years, save the District over \$300
million. Plans are to earmark
these funds for the Other Post
Employment Benefits (OPEB)
to help preserve retiree medical
benefits and life insurance.

Representatives of all labor unions at LAUSD negotiate health benefits for active and retired employees separately from the labor contracts. Currently Local 572 active and retired members receive fully paid benefits for themselves and their eligible family members.

LAUSD members are represented by two highly experienced business agents. Adriana Salazar Avila has worked at Local 572 since 2005. She began her career with LAUSD as a classified employee and was a Senior Human Resources Representative when she left LAUSD to join Local 572. Mike Ford has extensive union experience having worked as a representative and organizer for several different unions, including CSEA and SEIU. Both Adriana and Mike have also served as Personnel Commissioners for large school districts.

Costco Veteran to Give Life-Saving Gift

A 22-year Costco friendship has become a lifesaver for Michelle Gorum. Her friend and former co-worker Brenda Quintana is donating one of her healthy kidneys to her ailing friend.

A 22-year Costco friendship has become a lifesaver for Local 572 member Michelle Gorum. Her friend and former co-worker, Brenda Quintana, is donating one of her healthy kidneys to her ailing friend.

Michelle, a Costco veteran at Fullerton, was diagnosed with kidney failure last year. She faced a bleak future – dialysis three times a week and the prospect of an organ failure that could be fatal. A kidney transplant was a possibility, but sadly, the waiting list in Southern California is between eight and 10 years. However, if a patient needing a transplant can receive a kidney from a donor, the waiting time can be reduced to a few months.

Although Michelle tried to keep her condition a secret, her longtime friend found out. "I had a donor's card and thought, 'why not now?' I have two healthy kidneys and need only one to survive," she said.

An exhausting test schedule followed to ensure that their kidneys were compatible. The two friends spent months visiting the UC Irvine Hospital for EKGs, CAT scans, blood tests, X-rays—and then waited anxiously for the results.

They were encouraged: blood types matched and tissues matched. The much-needed operation has been scheduled for mid-July.

It won't be easy, but both women are facing the procedure with optimism and cheerfulness. The process requires short hospital stays followed by a long

recuperation – three to four weeks for both donor and recipient.

Fortunately, they are not facing financial burdens. Their Teamstersnegotiated health plan covers the entire procedure, including after care. Both women expressed their appreciation to the Teamsters and Costco for providing quality healthcare coverage.

The kidney donor, Brenda, took extended leave from Costco after earning her teaching certificate, and will use her vacation time to recuperate. She noted that she still maintains close ties with Costco – after all, her husband is also a Costco employee.

"We at Local 572 are incredibly moved by this heartwarming story," said Secretary-Treasurer Rick Middleton.

"We are proud that Brenda Quintana has the generosity and courage to donate this vital organ, so that Michelle Gorum can look forward to a healthy future."

Now the wait begins. In the meantime, Michelle must undergo four hours of dialysis beginning at 4:45 a.m. Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays. But now she has room for hope. "I'm so grateful to Brenda. She's saving my life."



Pepsi Drivers Go the Distance

The business agent for the Pepsi facility is Jaime Villanueva, who worked as both a merchandizer and driver before joining the Local 572 staff 16 years ago. Because of his 15 years with Pepsi, he understands the challenges his members face and is effective in working with members to solve work related

problems.

"The high seniority roster shows that Pepsi is a good place to work," reported Villaneuva. He credits shop stewards James Donnie Green and Vince Azarra with tremendous team spirit in their shared efforts to interface well between members on the job and the union that represents them.

Durham Bus Services Now Organized

Negotiations are underway for a contract to protect 150 new members at Durham Bus Services. The agreement will cover drivers, mechanics, bus aides and trainers in both Paramount and Compton.

Negotiations are underway for a contract to protect and improve the working conditions of 150 new members at Durham Bus Services. The contract will cover drivers, mechanics, bus aides and trainers in both Compton and Paramount.

In March Local 572 won the election to represent these members in its continuing effort to maintain a strong local union. Organizing new members is one important factor in protecting current members' jobs since non-union competition threatens union jobs. Non-union companies pay less and provide few, if any

companies can charge less and outbid union companies for major contracts.

The organizing drive began in early November 2017. "The drivers reached out for our union," reported Organizer Laura Vazquez. "They complained that management promises weren't being kept — and they wanted strong Teamster representation. They knew our good reputation in the school bus industry and wanted to be part of it."

A vigorous campaign followed. Assisted by an active employee committee, Organizer Laura Vazquez was able to show Durham employees that the workers would benefit from Teamster representation. An overwhelming vote for Local 572 followed.

Traci Smith is the business agent for the newly organized group and is currently negotiating the contract alongside Secretary-Treasurer Rick Middleton and a bargaining committee elected by the new Durham members. "It's reassuring to know that the new members are united and determined to stand firm in their quest for a quality contract," Smith reported.


Package car drivers must keep



SAFETY RATES HIGH AT MISSION SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION

Local 572 members at Mission School Transportation are charged with a very important task: the drivers must transport about half of the students of the Los Angeles Unified School District safely to and from school, as well as on school trips, team sporting events, and other special events.

The drivers must contend with everything from anxious young children separating from their parents in the early morning, to exuberant sports teams travelling to and from important games.

Cheering, shouting, laughing, arguing, and talk about homework are the background sounds for more than 300 drivers who work long days to ensure all students are safely transported to their scheduled destinations.

A good majority of the drivers are working mothers who take the job of transporting children very seriously. "They know the students and watch out for them as if they were their own," said Business Agent Traci Smith. She added, "This

is a demanding job that requires skill and lots of patience, especially when dealing with so many little personalities."

Business Agent Traci Smith's background has prepared her for the task of representing employees in the bus industry. She began as a driver for First Transit in the mid 1990's and served as a shop steward and bargaining committee member for many years. In 2004 she was hired as a bus company business agent by Local 572. She notes that as a working mother herself, she has experienced many of the same challenges her members face today.

"School bus yellow" buses must be safe and reliable. They are kept in top shape at the MST Los Angeles and Long Beach yards by skillful Local 572 mechanics. They perform the scheduled maintenance, necessary repairs, and fix emergency breakdowns.


